# NO FLYING SATURDAY IF POWER SECTION COMPS ARE ON MEMBERS NEWS

### SATURDAY Towie Peter Thorpe gets first hack

I was last to fly RDW so I knew how much gas was in the tank and that it was in good shape so I rocked up to the field a bit after 1000 hrs. Duty instructor Rex Carswell was there along with Kazik Jasica, Tony Prentice and Roy Whitby. The wind was more or less westerly with broken cloud around 2000ft and other stuff higher so we set up on grass 26. I did a preflight, added a bit of engine oil and polished the Perspex so we were ready to rock by 1126 when Rex



and Kazik launched in MW. The wind was quite brisk so we climbed to the west and made 2000 ft by Kumeu at which point I left them to it.



No other customers turned up so we packed up at about 1330. Derry Belcher was back from narrow boating in UK and was busy in the hangar with avionics guru Liviu sorting some radio problems with his own glider plus getting radio checks done for Ian O'Keefe on his. So we left the gliders outside and went home except I thought I would do some more work on the yellow tractor. The rubber connection for the induction pipe from carburettor to air cleaner was perished so I found a replacement at Mitre10 and spent a couple of hours

making it all fit before also heading for home, feeling quite virtuous. The tractor is not running perfectly but it is a whole lot better than it was before.

Instructor Rex Carswell adds.......Earlier in the week the weather forecast wasn't looking too promising for the weekend, but come Saturday morning it was initially looking okay - except a weak line of moisture was showing on the rain radar just off the west coast. Nah .. 'nothing to worry about' I thought, as I headed out under the sunshine. However, I had barely entered the Upper Harbour Motorway when the sky filled with low cloud, and light rain descended.

I was at the gate just a tad after 9:30, and Jonathan Pote was already there with clipboard in hand. The light rain passed through just as quickly as it arrived, but a good stiff westerly breeze was now with us. As I opened the hangar and extracted the tractors, I pondered if anyone would turn up to fly. Yep - it wasn't long before Kazik Jasica rocked up, then soon after, towie Peter Thorpe, CFI Ray Burns, Tony Prentice and Roy Whitby.

Kazik was keen to fly, and we launched into a cloud filled sky at 11:25am. The reported wind at 2000ft was westerly at 25kts.



Fortunately, it wasn't too bumpy after release and Kazik was able to exercise entering and exiting turns up to Va (max manoeuvering airspeed) for our glider. All good, but we didn't have any lift to keep us up there so it was a sled ride back into the circuit and land. So that was that - the only launch for the day. However, other things were happening on our patch. We had a 6 SQN ATC Cadet arrive to sign up with our club. She spent some time seeing how we operate and is looking forward to flying with us. Derry Belcher and Ian O'Keefe arrived along with avionics engineer Liviu, to carry out some checks on their gliders. They stayed on, while most of us departed around 2:30pm.





SUNDAY the other towie Andrew Williams also got there first....

It was a beautiful day for flying. The wind was consistent and the sky was free of rain. Once the early morning overcast conditions lifted we got setup. Kazik and Brendan got a brief from Steve on cross country considerations, etc. I decided to make the most of the good weather by going for a tiki tour of the city. Tony and Roy were both keen to come so I suggested we do a couple of flights. Roy graciously allowed Tony to go first, but unfortunately we ran out of time by the end of the day to do a second flight. Next time! Ray was taking NW to Drury and took off just before us. We soon departed and followed him out over the Harbour Bridge, city and to St Heliers, but before we could catch up he changed frequency and headed on south, while we turned north. We tracked up the coast to Milford, before heading over Rosedale Road, then out to Riverhead, Kumeu and Waimauku. We landed and shortly after Kazik was ready to get started. We ended up doing five tows before packing it up. It was a beautiful day and I was surprised there weren't more aircraft out over the city enjoying it. There was plenty of aeroclub training happening at Whenuapai though!



Instructor Steve Wallace adds a couple of details......As I drove to the airfield in low cloud and drizzle the day did not look too promising but the forecast said it was going to clear up and that we would get a good few hours of nice thermals before marine air from the west blued everything out in our area. That's pretty much what happened. The morning visible satellite picture showed the back of the frontal cloud had quite a sharp clearance line and as we began to set up the clear air and blue skies could be easily seen to the South West. We elected to wait a bit for the clearance to arrive so

sat in the caravan and did a bit of QGP theory with Kazik Jasica and Brendan Moore. After a Boeing

departure at 11.30am we got underway around midday. First up was Kazik who wanted to look at safe gliding distance back to the field so of tow he picked up a nice thermal and we made our way out to the far side of the Riverhead Forest and then guessed / calculated the height we would arrive back at the circuit at. It all worked out nicely to within a few hundred feet. Having been away for almost an hour this inspired Tony Prentice in BD and Kris Pillai in MP to come and try their luck. The good stuff was slowly drifting off to the North and East however so things were getting trickier. Brendan was also keen to get into some of the QGP so up we went and did some high speed stuff before coming back to earth and calling it a day. So not a bad day considering how it started out weather wise.
