Weekend Reports

Saturday - Ivor Reports on a busy but turbulent day.....

Saturday looked like it could be an OK gliding day. Flying was scheduled for both the 103 Twin and the 109 ATC motor glider, so following breakfast in the local cafe, Ray and I opened up the field at around 9, and started getting things ready.

As I was sorting things out, I was joined by tow pilot Tony and duty pilot Ryan, as well as Logan, who was taking a short break from his studies. We were also joined by Rex and Ben S, as well as Kazik, who all helped out considerably throughout the day.

The wind was a gusty north-easterly, so once the aircraft were ready, we transported things to the 08 end, joining the ATC group who had already had their first flight, with several more scheduled for the day.

First up in the 103 was Logan, wanting more accurate landing practice. The conditions made things particularly tricky, however Logan was more than up to the task, and had two good circuits, with successful short landings.

Then it was a trial flight with Sophia. Despite the less than ideal conditions, she was a very enthusiastic trainee who loved the whole experience and managed some good hands on flying. She is sure she will be taking up the sport in the very near future.

Her flight was followed by two circuits by Ryan, who is working on perfecting his short field landings. We laid out an aiming point marker before launching, to provide good measurable feedback. The wind by now was fairly unpredictable, swinging from north to east with a very variable strength, leading to challenges making both accurate circuits as well as short, well controlled landings. On his first circuit Ryan found precision challenging, but managed a respectable approach and landing. His second attempt was much better. He was able to explain his planning throughout the circuit and approach, and his landing was a good one that he was very happy with.

The last flight for the day in the 103 was a circuit with Ben S, who was wanting to experience the conditions, and practice accuracy in the unpredictable cross-wind. His flying was very accurate throughout, and his landing would have successfully got him safely into a short paddock.

While we moved everything back to the hangar and packed up the aircraft, the 109 was completing the last of its flights for the day. Tony went off to fill the fuel tanks ready for flying the next day while the ATC packed the 109 back into its hangar.

That all done, people headed home. We were all locked up by 1600, following 15 glider flights for the day.

Sunday Lionel Reports - Another Challenging Weather Day for Students

Despite the testing conditions, students made fantastic progress today.

Anton started strong, practicing aerotow out-of-position techniques along with crosswind take offs and landings. Lev followed, getting the full rodeo experience thanks to some gusty crosswinds during his flight. Logan took to the skies next, flying with confidence and polish and successfully completing his BFR.

Michael Weyna tackled the bumpy air, responded to an (planned) aerotow wave-off, and executed a splendidly flown circuit.

To finish, Anton returned for a bounce recovery exercise, rounding out the day with style.

It was a challenging day, no doubt—but full of valuable training and great achievements. Well done to all involved, and a big thank-you to the support team for making it happen!
